Public Safety and Security

Should you have an issue where the local police have been contacted, please inform the CFSU(E) MP Det. Ensure that you provide the MP's with as many details about the incident. The MP will conduct a police report for your records and loss report.

Family Information Line

Communications

Calling within Europe

When making a call within your own country, there is no need to include the exit and country code. If you call within the same area code, you do not need to use the area code but add a "O" before the number to call inside Europe.

Calling outside of Europe



To make a call outside of Europe, use the outgoing country exit code, country code where you are calling, area code, and telephone number. When you see the + symbol, it indicates to use the exit code specific to the country you are in. In Europe, the exit code is 00, while in Canada, it is 011. You can use the + on your mobile as the exit code, and your phone should automatically use the correct exit code. To call Canada, the country code is 1. When calling a Canadian number from Europe, follow this format: 00 - 1 - area code - sevendigit number.

Calling Europe from Canada

The exit code in Canada is 011 followed by the country code, area code and phone number. In Europe, phone numbers vary in format and are seven to 10 digits.

Sim Cards

Most Canadians will use a mobile phone while in Europe. If your Canadian mobile works on a GSM network, you can use it in Europe. A CRTC law bans cellphone unlocking fees and orders that all new devices be unlocked. Canadians no longer have to pay to have their cell phones unlocked. With an unlocked phone, you can use any mobile company simply by switching the SIM card in the back. Make sure to unlock the phone before moving, as the provider might not assist once the account is closed.



Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP)

Numerous Canadian families have opted for a VoIP phone, which is worth exploring before departing from Canada to retain your Canadian phone number. It offers several advantages, such as allowing your family and friends to call you without incurring overseas long-distance charges and vice versa. Additionally, it simplifies communication for individuals unfamiliar with European calling practices, such as elderly parents. Maintaining a Canadian phone number can also make it easier to bank, complete online forms, and register on Canadian websites.



WhatsApp

WhatsApp is a free, multiplatform messaging app that lets you make video and voice calls, send text messages, and more – all with just a Wi-Fi connection. <u>www.whatsapp.com</u>

Signal

Signal functions like WhatsApp and is the preferred app by some CAF units for end-to-end encryption. This app is available on mobile devices.



Support

With some families living in local communities while others in base accommodations, families may have different housing experiences. Your posting could be to a remote area or a large city, with vast differences between the two. General

- European houses tend to be smaller than in Canada.
- Public transport availability and access
- You can bring your current vehicle or buy a new or used upon arrival. In some remote locations, owning two cars is suggested to avoid dependant/spouse isolation.
- When house hunting and if you have kids, consider the catchment area of the schools in your neighbourhood, as some of them can be small.



Canadian Forces Support Unit (CFSUE)

Depending on your location in Europe, you may only visit the Detachment (Det) during In and Out Clearance, or you may visit often. Appliances



European appliances are usually smaller than what you are used to in Canada. Often, families will need to buy some appliances. Some also find their European fridge insufficient and prefer having a second one.

Tips!

- North American pans do not always fit in European ovens.
- The washer and dryer are often much smaller and slower. This can pose problems for washing typical Canadian bedding.

Wardrobes

Most houses do not have closets or other cabinets for storage; instead, they often have wardrobes to store items.

Beds

You should note bed and bedding sizes differ between Canada and Europe. It may be helpful to purchase extra bedding before your move, or you may need it shipped from Canada.

Basements

Almost all homes have no cellars or basements due to the extra cost of digging further into the subsoil and the requirement for much deeper foundations and waterproof tanking.





Electricity

Electricity in Europe differs from Canada with higher voltage and lower frequency. In Canada, electricity is 110V and 60Hz, while in Europe, it is 220-230V and 50Hz. Some electronics are not compatible with European power and require transformers, while others are dual voltage and only require a plug adapter. To find out if an electronic is dual voltage, look for the electronic information on the product. This information is often found on the bottom, back or the battery pack. If the input gives a range such as 100-240V 50-60Hz, the product is dual voltage and works with Canadian and European electricity. If the input does not show a range and only says 110V 60Hz, it is incompatible with European electricity.

Dual Voltage

If your product is dual voltage, you only need a plug adapter. Since the product is already compatible with local electricity, the adapter allows the prongs to fit the electrical outlets. If you use an adapter with a product that is not dual voltage, you will not only damage your product, but you may also cause electrical damage to the building. Lamps are typically dual voltage; however, replace the light bulbs with European lightbulbs.

Single Voltage

If your electronics only say 110V 60Hz, it is incompatible with European electricity. To use electronics while in Europe, you will need a transformer. Transformers convert the local electricity to 110V 60Hz, so you can plug devices in as if you were plugging them into a wall in Canada.

Transformers

Transformers come in various wattage ratings, so use the correct transformer to handle what you are plugging into it. The total wattage of appliances plugged into the transformer must be less than the transformer wattage rating. Find out the wattage of an electronic device, if it is not on the label, by multiplying the item's voltage by the number of amperes (amps). Research before purchasing to ensure it meets your needs.
