

The Newfoundland and Labrador Medical Care Plan (MCP) is a comprehensive plan of medical care insurance designed to cover the cost of physician services for residents of the province. Important Note: Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) dependents are exempt from the three month (90 day) waiting period. The spouse or dependent(s) of a regular member of the CAF who has entered the province from another Canadian province or territory are entitled to first-day coverage provided they have established residence in the province of Newfoundland and Labrador.

CLIMATE & GEOGRAPHY

PREPARING FOR THE SEASONS

The island of Newfoundland has a variety of climate types, but it is designated as a cool summer humid continental climate. The Gulf Stream makes the waters south of Newfoundland very warm with water temps as high as 22°c creating foggy, windy, and moody cloudy days when mixed with the cold Atlantic water. The result of the frigid Northern Labrador Current meeting with the warm Gulf Stream also creates bazaar weather with very strong high and low pressures resulting in days that can display all four seasons.

St. John's is also prone to a lot of precipitation year-round, making it the wettest outside of British Columbia, due to the tracking of many tropical storms and at times hurricanes that swipe through the province. The City has a unique energy, and the weather dictates conversations amongst all residents, due to the fact it is the foggiest, windiest, cloudiest, and almost the wettest of all the major cities of Canada.

Seasonly, spring is paired with winter like temps, it is often very cold and long which can create "seasonal affective disorder", and summer hits with a vengeance out of nowhere not preparing you for hot and humid days resulting in week long stints of +20°c that feel like a sticky +30°c. Fall time in the metro area is later then mainland Canada, beautiful and very pleasant. Yet the late fall, be prepared for hurricane season, which lasts until the end of the year. The North East Avalon winters are grey, full of freak snowstorms, and can often dump whole seasons worth of snow in hours, that disappear with rain.

By early July, in most years, atmospheric adjustments produce a mean westerly airflow over Labrador, and a southwesterly one over the island. This marks the onset of summer conditions. The character of the summer then depends upon the relative strengths of the two weather systems. Most often these days are filled with warm breezes and warm nights. Summer is the time when those who 'come from away' come to Newfoundland and fall in love. It's a great time to go hiking, see all kinds of whales and seabirds, you may even get to enjoy some

warm weather and a campfire at the beach.



In these few months you will get between 14-16 hours of light a day. Late caplin will still spawn. Icebergs are gone from the east coast. Warm weather abounds with fog patches during the early hours. Lots of tourists cover the scenic highlights. Whales are easily seen from shore

or up close from a boat. Plenty of puffins and other open sea birds can be spotted on the water. Trails are in good condition but get soggy

Summer hits with a vengeance out of nowhere not preparing you for hot and humid days resulting in week long stints of +20°c that feel like a sticky +30°c.

Fall time in the metro area is slightly later, beautiful and very pleasant, yet the late fall be prepared for hurricane season, which lasts until the end of the year.

The North East Avalon winters are grey, full of freak snowstorms, and can often dump whole seasons worth of snow in hours, that disappear with rain.
