LOCATION

Country: Belgium Town: Mons Info to consider:

- You will require a Belgian ID card. Once posted to Belgium, always travel with your Belgian ID card (speak to DET). Belgian law requires that everyone carry official identification at all times.
- The Belgian Government only recognizes foreign national (non-EU countries) children younger than 18 as dependents. Children 18 and older not enrolled full-time in school in Belgium may not reside at the post or stay in the country longer than 90 days in a 180 day period.
- Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe (SHAPE)
- Family (non-dependents) can visit and stay 90 days without a visa (Schengen Area).

POPULATION

Size: Mons – 95,000; Belgium – 11.3 million

Ethnicity: 92% of the population has Belgian citizenship, and 6% other EU. Belgium is home to two main linguistic groups: the Dutch-speaking, mostly Flemish community, which constitutes about 59% of the population, and the French-speaking, mostly Walloon population, which comprises 41% of all Belgians.

LANGUAGE(S)

Official language: Belgium's official languages are French, Dutch, and German (which highly depends on the region/or province where you live). Official services are provided mainly in these three languages.

Prevalence of French or English speaking: French in the economy. The working language at SHAPE is English.

COST OF LIVING

Exchange rate to consider: Euro

QUALITY OF LIFE

Climate and potential for severe weather, natural disasters:

• Winter temperatures rarely drop below zero and averages around 4 degrees Celsius. The average high summer temperatures are in the low 20s.

Laws and culture:

- Alcohol inexpensive. Beer plays a large role in Belgian culture.
- Drinking age 16 (wine/beer) and 18 (hard liquor).
- A Canadian driver's licence and an IDP are no longer valid once you have obtained residence status in Belgium. Before it expires, you may exchange your Canadian driver's licence for a Belgian licence if it was issued by Alberta, New Brunswick, Ontario or Quebec.
- You must be at least 18 years of age to drive a car in Belgium.
- If you are a Canadian citizen, but also a citizen of Belgium, consular services may be limited.
- Penalties for drinking and driving are severe. The legal blood alcohol limit is 0.05%. Convicted offenders can expect heavy fines, and your driver's licence may be confiscated immediately.

Safety and security:

- While it is a safe city, look out for pickpockets as in any European city.
- There is a threat of terrorism in Europe. Terrorists have carried out attacks in several European cities. Further attacks in Europe are likely.

Level of isolation:

• There are 50-60 Canadian families in this location.

HOUSING

- Availability can vary from houses, bungalows, semi-detached or detached, apartments, old farmhouses either renovated, new construction or everything in between.
- Basements are not dry-heated or equipped with air exchangers. Storing items in these types of basements/caves can damage your belongings.
- Spaces are smaller than what a Canadian standard house would offer.
- Canadians are not allowed to rent on base, they have to rent in Mons.
- Finding appropriate housing can be challenging depending on the family size (harder to find when you have more than two children).

EMPLOYMENT

Are there employment opportunities for spouses? Due to tax and legal implications, spousal employment in Belgium is not a realistic option.

- Language abilities in French would be a condition for employment.
- There are very limited employment opportunities available through CFMWS, families should plan to be single-income for the duration of the posting.

Op tempo: The op tempo will vary greatly depending on the position. TD is possible.

HEALTH CARE

Access: High-quality medical facilities are widely available.

- There is a Healthcare Clinic located on the base that treats member and their families. Services offered include pharmacy, immunization clinic, x-ray department, and laboratory.
- Health Services in Mons are provided in French, so it may take longer to find an English-speaking specialist.
- All bills associated with the care of dependents are the member's personal responsibility and are to be claimed through PSHCP

Special needs:

- Yes, supports are available but are very limited depending on the language required (English/French), area of specialization, and degree of support needed.
- It is highly advised that the family consult with Medical Screening Officer in Canada and/or the Canadian Element to ensure that the required services are readily available in either English or French before accepting a posting.

Consideration for pregnancy/birthing:

• Health care for pregnancy and birthing is available in Mons.

Dental:

• Dental care can be accessed in town. You are required to pay upfront, and you can then claim your expenses.

SCHOOLING

- Schooling is typically through SHAPE International School US Elementary Section for SK, SHAPE International School US Elementary Section for grades 1-8, SHAPE International School US Secondary Section for grades 9-12, École Internationale du SHAPE Section kindergarten for grades JK and SK, SHAPE International School Canadian Section for grades 1-8, or École Internationale du SHAPE Section international for grades 1-12.
- Belgian schools are closed Wednesday afternoons.

Curriculum vs. Canadian curriculum:

- Curriculum varies depending on the choice of school.
- Some schools will offer Canadian history or geography as they are based on the Ontario curriculum.

Resources for special needs children:

- Access to special needs services depends on the choice of school, language required (English/French), area of specialization and degree of support needed, it may be very limited.
- Consult with CEM and the school before any commitments.

CHILDCARE

• Largely available in town, but no guarantee staff will speak English.

Is there a Military Family Services centre available in that location?

• Yes, under MFS(E) Casteau/SHAPE.

Psychosocial/mental health resources:

• Not at the post, and the MFS(E) SW is for dependents only. The CAF SW/Mental Health Team for members and families is in Geilenkirchen, Germany. The chaplain is at SHAPE, Belgium.

Communications (e.g. quality of Internet connection):

• Good, reliable, and widely offered.

ACTIVITIES

Access to sports or other leisure activities:

- Access to NATO Base Leisure Center
- Wide variety, although English might be limited
